
Falls among Older Adults

A look at national and state data



Fall rates continue to increase across the United States.

- 1 in 4 older adults fall every year.
- Less than half tell their doctor.
- Falling once doubles your risk for falling again.
- 1 in 5 falls causes a serious injury.


Falls in Ohio

- 1,563 emergency department visits
- 374 hospitalizations
- 22 deaths....

....All due to fall injuries







Falls in Ohio


 Residents ages 65 and older account for 84% of all fall deaths and 75% of nonfatal fall hospitalizations in Ohio.

 Falls are the *leading cause of traumatic brain injury (TBI)* in Ohio residents ages 65 and older. Falls account for 63% of TBI deaths and 67% of TBI hospitalizations.




Total charges for inpatient treatment of leading causes of injury in Ohio, 2013








2018 Highlights

Don't fall for me Valentine


- STEADY U launched a campaign to encourage young children to show love to the older adults in in their lives by helping them to prevent falls.
- Elementary schools made Valentine's Day cards which were delivered to local veteran hospitals and nursing homes.





Medication Safety Week

- Ohio hosted a Medication Safety
 Week during the first week of April.
- Engaged pharmacies statewide to select a day during this week to invite older adults to have their medications reviewed.
- Over 400 chain and independent pharmacies participated.





Senior Day at the Ohio State Fair

- Hosted "Well Beyond 60!" Expo at the Ohio State Fair on Senior Day in July.
- More than 1,000 older adults participated in free screenings.
 - Blood pressure screenings
 - Vision screenings
 - Falls risk assessments
 - Balance screenings
 - Nutrition education



Walgreens Partnership

- Monthly Senior Day August theme was falls prevention.
- Information was provided to customers on STEADY U, Matter of Balance, and local aging resources.
- Older adults were given 1,000 balance rewards points for talking to pharmacists about falls prevention.
- Area agency on aging staff helped educate pharmacists about how and when to make referrals on the supports available through the area agencies.

10 Million Steps to Prevent Falls

- To celebrate National Falls Prevention Awareness Day, STEADY U asked all Ohioans to help take "10 Million Steps to Prevent Falls" throughout the month of September.
- 106 groups or events
- 89 event or group sponsors
- 16,034 participants
- 31,273 miles walked
- 78.2 million steps







Ohio Department of Health Violence and Injury Prevention Program (VIPP)

- Coordinate surveillance systems that collect injury data
- Assess the burden of injuries and violence
- Promote evidence-based interventions
- Collaborate with partners to build program infrastructure
- Encourage the adoption of policies
- Provide technical support and training opportunities



VIPP Funding

- CDC Core Violence and Injury Prevention Grant
- Funded for injury surveillance and prevention since 2000
- State fall prevention initiatives including Ohio Older Adult Falls Prevention Coalition
- 2014 2018 local fall prevention initiatives: Delaware, Erie, Holmes, and Union Counties
- 2019 2023 local fall prevention initiatives: Erie, Holmes, Lucas, Union, and Washington Counties





Ohio Injury Prevention Partnership (OIPP)

- Data driven coalition focused on leading causes of injury to Ohioans
- Priorities developed as a result of strategic planning in 2007-2008
- Led by VIPP with funds from CDC

- Priority areas include:
 - Falls among older adults
 - Child injury
 - Prescription drug overdose

• Coalition Mission: To reduce the risk of falls through partnerships, education, and policy


• Coalition Vision: Older Ohioans will have fewer falls and fall-related injuries, maximizing their independence and quality of of life.

Pilot Projects

- Annual grant opportunity for communities across Ohio to implement fall prevention policy, environmental, or systems change
- Funded 34 pilot projects across Ohio since 2013
- \$110,014 provided in grant funds
- Resulted in \$306,652 of donations and in-kind support*

2018 Projects

- Alliance City Health Department Partner with the University of Mount Union to implement the Matter of Balance program
- Mercy Health Foundation Implement home assessments and modifications through a community paramedicine program
- Perry County Job and Family Services Implement a home assessment and modification program
- Putnam County Health Department Implement a Tai Chi program
- TriHealth Think First Injury Prevention Program Expand the Stepping On program in Southwestern Ohio

Mount Carmel and Shift Grandview

- Funded in 2014 and 2015 to train Tai
 Chi instructors
- Successfully trained 164 instructors in the Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus, Toledo areas as well as several rural communities

Stepping On

TriHealth Think First Injury Prevention

- Funded in 2017 and 2018 to train Stepping On facilitators
- Trained 40 facilitators in 2017 in Cincinnati area
- Will train an additional 20 facilitators in 2018-2019









Fall risk and home assessments

Mercy Medical Center Stark County, Ohio

- Incorporated fall risk assessment for all seniors 65+ presenting in the ED beginning in October 2016
- Expanding the assessments to urgent care locations in 2018-2019
- Completed 21,781 fall risk assessments
- 7,123 patients had a STEADI score of 4 or greater
- Coordinate outreach to primary care physicians
- Provide educational booklets
- Provide physical therapy screenings and make referrals
- Established partnerships between Mercy's EMS Outreach Coordinator and 5 local fire departments to conduct home assessments for high risk patients






Home safety and medication reviews

Ohio Northern University Hardin County, Ohio

- Incorporated program into discharge planning at therapy department of skilled nursing facility
- 50 pharmacy students trained
- 27 medication reviews and 14 modifications to medication regimens
- 26 older adults received home safety education
- Expanding program to additional pharmacy schools in Ohio beginning in 2019





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
