



Community-engaged research (CEnR)

- Research WITH communities
- Partnerships between communities and academics
- Exchange of expertise between academics (as scientific experts) and communities (local, cultural, practice experts)
- Broad spectrum: minimal collaboration to equal partners in all aspects of the research

CEnR is **NOT**

- A method or set of methods- Can be quantitative, qualitative, RCT
- Research IN or ON communities
- Top-down or 'outside expert' approach
- For everyone









CEnR Principles

- Focus on local issues/priorities
- Builds on community strengths & resources
- Facilitates collaboration in all phases of research
- Mutual respect
- Power sharing and flexibility
- Co-learning: academics & community learn together
- Disseminates findings to all partners
- Strives for results that mobilize resources, influence systems, & catalyze new policies, programs, & practices

CEnR benefits

- Improves recruitment/retention of participants in studies (Greiner et al)
- Interventions strengthened by community insight
 - Better questions
 - Better understanding of conditions that drive/impact behaviors
 - More feasible interventions=increased likelihood of success in real world environments (Wallerstein and Duran)
- Enrichment of the evidence base by incorporating community theories re: etiology and change (Wallerstein and Duran)

CEnR benefits

- Research participation improves health outcomes
 - increasing efficiency
 - increasing sustainability
 - more equitable distribution of services
- CEnR has been applied to reduce health disparities across a broad array of topics and initiatives
 - Asthma
 - Cancer screening
 - Diabetes
 - Cardiovascular disease
 - Violence
 - Injury
 - Immunization coverage
 - HIV and others...

CEnR challenges

- Requires new/different skills
 - Most academics have not been trained in CEnR approach/lack skills for working with communities
- Finding a suitable community partner
 - Understanding who represents community
 - Research readiness
 - Stability
 - Topic match
 - "Act now" POV
- Resources
 - Time and money

CEnR challenges

- University/Department support for CEnR
 - Does your Department head get/value CEnR?
 - Are their mentors available to you?
 - Do promotion and tenure guidelines reflect CEnR?
 - CEnR takes time –it may slow publication pipelines
 - Your best references may not be in academia –how will these be valued?
 - Products may not be "traditional" academic outputs e.g. policy change vs. papers and research grants
 - Can you sub-contract with community institutions?
 - Can your IRB work with community institutions?

CEnR challenges

- Institutional/research history in community
 - How did previous researchers in community do?
 - Trusting relationships
 - Community benefits
 - Legacy of Tuskegee
- Funders preparedness
 - Do RFPs allow for CEnR
 - Do reviewers' understand CEnR
- Peer-review publications
 - Are they accepting of/value CEnR contributions
